Elements of Art

<u>Line</u> – A path made by a moving point through space. It is onedimensional and can vary in width, direction and length.

<u>Shape</u> – Shapes are flat, enclosed areas that are twodimensional (width and height). Artists use both geometric and organic shapes.

Form – Three-dimensional (length, width, height) and can be viewed from many angles. Forms have volume and take up space.

<u>Tone</u> – describes the lightness or darkness of a surface. To show form at least three different tones should be used; shadows, mid-tones and highlights.

Techniques and Processes

<u>Artist Study</u> – Researching, Responding to, interpreting meaning, and forming your own opinions about an artist, their artwork and their style

<u>Composition</u> – The way you place, arrange or position objects or main points of focus in your artwork. This can help make your art more visually interesting

Pencil Grades – Pencils are graded on how hard or soft they are on a scale. Pencils graded H are harder and lighter. Pencils grade B are softer and darker

Mark Making - Describes the different lines, dots, marks, patterns, and textures we create in an artwork. It can be loose and gestural or controlled and neat.
