Subject Specific Terminology.

- Code and conventions of newspapers: price, layout, use of cover photographs/ images, house style, bylines.
- Narrative: headlines used to tease people to want to read certain stories (could be linked to Roland Barthes' enigma codes).
- **Stereotyping:** Using images to create meaning e.g: offices
- Industry: Newspapers used to be extremely profitable although print circulation has suffered, modern newspapers are online.
- Social, historical and political contexts:
 Newspapers are heavily influenced by contexts (that is literally the news!)
