


5 Pillars of Islam



Shahadah

- There is no God but Allah and Muhammad is His messenger
- Said when you become a Muslim
- Recited at every prayer
- First and last words a Muslim should hear



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Salah

- · Wudu- ritual cleansing before prayer
- 5 daily prayers
- Face Makkah
- Different prayer positions
- Makes a Muslim feel closer to Allah
- It helps to remove sins and temptations











Sawm

- Fasting from dawn till dusk
- No food or drink
- Spiritual time-reading the Qur'an, extra prayers, being more charitable
- Allows you to empathise with the poor
- 29/30 days
- Laylatul Qadr-27th night
- Qur'an was revealed




Zakah

- Compulsory charity for those who can afford it
- 2.5% of your excess wealth to be donated to the poorest of the poor
- Is a sin if you do not give it
- Cleanses your wealth
- · Wealth is a gift from Allah-tested to see how you use it
- Voluntary charity-Sadagah


Hajj

- Once in a lifetime for those who can afford it and are healthy enough
- Remembers important figures in Islam like Muhammed and Ibrahim
- Specific ritual completed
- All equal before Allah
- All sins are forgivensinless like a new baby

Lesser Jihad



Holy war - fighting a war to defend Allah and/or Islam. A war that Allah would stand by as being morally right.

Laylat Al-Qadr



The night of power when the Qur'an was revealed to the prophet Muhammad.

Jihadists



Groups who are prepared to use violence to create their own Islamic state. These are extremists and their victims are mainly Muslims. IS/ISIS is an example of this.


To follow the Sunnah (the way of) the Prophet Muhammad

The use of violence in self-defence, or to defend Islam/Allah It was set out by Muhammad when people were trying to wipe out Islam and its followers.

It cannot be used aggressively and should never be used to kill civilians (non-soldiers)

The Crusades were an example of a true Jihad. Terrorism is NOT jihad!

> Definition: Jihad- striving, or doing one's utmost in the way of Islam



Id-ul-Adha

The festival of sacrifice Most important festival Marks the end of Haji. Remembers Ibrahim being prepared to sacrifice his son Ishma'il. New clothes, food presents, Id prayers at mosque, animal eaten

Id-ul-Fitr

- Festival of fast-breaking
- End of Ramadan (fasting)
- Feast, clothes, mosque for special sermon
- Zakah-ul-Fitr special charity contribution
- Generosity and gratitude

Ashura

Most important to Shi'a – remembers when Husayn was killed (martyred)

Sunni - Remembers when Allah saved the Israelites from Pharoah

How it is remembered:

Wear black, Processions in the street, Whipping yourself-draw blood, Reading the Qur'an, Fasting, visit graves

Other festivals:

- Mawlid-an-Nabi the birth of the Prophet Muhammad.
- Laylat-al-Qadr the night of Power when the Qur'an was revealed to the Prophet.
- Muharram the first month of the Islamic calender. Marks the Hijrah – when the first Islamic community was set up. Differently celebrated between Sunni and Shi'a.



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



